Educate Together at the Forum on Patronage and Pluralism

A three-day public session of the Forum on Patronage and Pluralism was held at the Department of Education on 22, 23 and 24 June 2011. The Forum, established by the Minister for Education and Skills, Ruairi Quinn TD, is seeking to enable greater pluralism in the governance of schools.

Parents, patrons, teachers and school communities were asked to submit their views on the need for diversity and how the transfer of patronage might be managed. An advisory group will consider these submissions, and report back to the Minister in the Autumn. Educate Together, as the representative body for multidenominational schools and those campaigning for them, made a detailed submission to the Forum.

In its submission, Educate Together proposed the following key elements to the Forum:

Register of Parental School
Preference

The introduction of an independent local body that maintains a register of the school type preference of parents of pre-school children and has authority to call patrons and managers of schools in their area to discuss and act to ensure that local school provision is matched as closely as possible to community demand.

• Introduce effective regulation of patrons of schools

The privileges granted to patrons of schools under the Education Act (1998) should be balanced by a set of regulations that ensure appropriate accountability to the public for the exercise of these powers and the considerable amount of State funds that flow to the patron's schools. Included in these should be an obligation to make available to other educational uses, any education facilities that are under-utilised or vacant that have been funded by or grant aided by the State.

Introduce an agreed, supported procedure for the transformation of patronage of schools

As Irish society continues on its generation on generation change of parental preference for schools, there will be increasing demand for change of school types in communities. It is essential that an agreed procedure for transformation of school patronage emerges and that this procedure is actively supported by the State. This process should be driven in the first instance by existing demand and the register of parental preference detailed above.

• Provision of Educate Together model schools in all areas of the country

Genuine choice of school type that is compatible with the constitutional and human rights of all families can only be achieved if an equality-based school such as that provided in the Educate Together model is available in all areas of the country. This is also the only way in which the State can discharge its obligation to provide for the education of all children in the country and to do so without religious discrimination.

Educate Together's submission argued that the State should allow the timely processing of the many applications for new Educate Together schools that are currently lodged with the Department of Education and Skills.

Paul Rowe (Chief Executive), Emer Nowlan (Head of Education & Network Development) and Deirdre O'Donoughe (Head of Leadership & Governance) represented Educate Together at the public session of the Forum.

Update: Ethos Self-evaluation

Five schools have completed the ethos self-evaluation process rolled out by Educate Together since March. They are: Tralee ETNS, Wicklow ETNS, Donabate / Portrane ETNS, Dublin 7 ETNS and Skerries ETNS.

In each school a committee organised the distribution of written questionnaires to members of the Board and staff and also to parents and pupils. Educate Together provided a draft of the questionnaires to schools, who adopted them as they saw fit. In many cases the questionnaires were translated into different languages. The committee then collated the results, providing invaluable information for the school on the perspectives of the different partners on the ethos of the school. The questionnaires were then complemented by focus group sessions with the different partners, facilitated by Molly O' Duffy, Ethos Development Officer, or Fionnuala Ward, Primary Education Officer. These meetings were generally lively events, and served to delve further into replies to the questionnaires or raise issues that had not been included.

All five Boards of Management now have a complete snapshot of the state of the ethos in their school and will take action on the basis of the findings. Niamh Mc Guirk, teacher rep. on the Board of Management of Donabate/ Portrane ETNS comments that "the process was really constructive and reflective. It raised awareness of positive elements of our ethos that we had taken for granted, and identified areas to focus on for the year ahead. It was wonderful that all members of the school community had a voice. It created a buzz around ethos in the school".

Educate Together Founder Member Awarded Honorary Degree

Micheal Johnston, one of the founder members of the Dalkey School Project and the Educate Together movement, has been honoured with an Honorary Degree from Trinity College.

A former journalist with RTÉ, Micheal Johnston, together with Áine Hyland and Desmond Green, co-ordinated the first parent campaign for multi-denominational education in Ireland. Their campaign through the mid seventies faced considerable opposition and was seen as radical or even subversive in some quarters.

Their efforts however, successfully attracted the support of Jack Lynch who honoured a pre-election commitment with the opening of the Dalkey School Project in 1978. This school then proved the catalyst for a number of new multidenominational schools and the founding of the Educate Together patron body in the following years.

Micheal Johnston has remained an active member of the Educate Together movement throughout his life. He is still involved in education and is the current Chair of the Board of Newpark Comprehensive School. The awards ceremony took place in Trinity College Examination's Hall on Friday July 1st at 3pm.

Aladdin Schools

Aladdin Schools is a student information management system that is purpose built to meet the needs of Irish Primary Schools. Its web based interface is simple to use allowing Principals, Secretaries, Teachers and Parents immediate access to student records and information, thereby greatly increasing efficiencies and supporting collaborative learning. The Aladdin system is easy to use; there's no software to install, or equipment to buy - if you can browse the internet you can use Aladdin to provide secure access to student information. Edubills

EduBills is a secure online payment system for school books and other school expenses. It allows parents to order their school's entire school book list online along with the option of paying any other payment request from the school such as book rentals, arts and crafts, stationery, photocopying, tours, sports and so on. Also the school book supplier refunds the school a % of the revenue from all book sales.

With Edubills.ie, the school secretary can publish any online payment request whenever the need arises. Edubills.ie are offering the system free (with free lifetime license) to the first 100 Irish schools who adopt the online payments system.
