

Keynote Address: Dr Charlotte Holland, DCU Workshops

The 4th annual Ethical Education conference is a highlight of the teaching year. We recommend that all Educate Together schools should be represented at the conference. This year's theme of "Education for a Sustainable Environment" speaks to a core element of the Ethical Education curriculum in Educate Together schools.

Why Education for a Sustainable Environment?

One of the biggest challenges facing the world currently are the unsustainable levels of development that are degrading and destroying the environment. As global citizens we are collectively placing unsustainable demands on our planet's capacity. Consequences include resource depletion and waste disposal, climate change, extinction of species and challenges to the integrity of ecosystems.

This Conference will focus on supporting educators to address these issues in their classrooms and schools through Ethical Education. Friday's panel discussion includes Eco Eye's Duncan Stewart and Óisín Coughlan of Friends of the Earth. Saturday's keynote address by Dr. Charlotte Holland (DCU) promises to both engage and challenge, followed by top quality workshops designed to leave educators with a wide range of ideas and practical solutions to bring back to their schools.

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New Crest for Citywest ETNS

Caitriona Hand is Principal of Citywest ETNS, Dublin and is also on the Board of Directors of Educate Together. Here Caitriona shares with us how they have been putting Educate Together's democratic ideal into practice in Citywest ETNS.

As principal I'm really proud to reveal our new school crest, particularly because it was designed by our Student Council (which has pupils from 2nd to 5th class). The crest features a silhouette of children in our school and includes a child from the class for children with autism.

The process of designing and developing the new crest was a model of democracy and student voice in action, and has resulted in a truly special and meaningful school crest for Citywest ETNS. We'll be using it in all the obvious places like our social media pages, letterhead, signage for the school and also on our school sports team jerseys. It's wonderful to see the children's work being displayed in such a way.

The Student Council presented the crest to the school's Board of Management where they outlined the process they had gone through to come up with a design. They also identified the meaning of each element of the crest and why it had been chosen:

- The castle represents the building of our school and where we learn. Even if we move school, the building will be part of our history. Castles are also strong, safe places.
- The Golden Book. This had featured in lots of the children's designs. Each week at school assembly, Caitriona reads the names of those pupils nominated for inclusion in the Golden book for upholding school values.
- Rainbows featured in nearly every one of the children's designs. Rainbows represent so many things for example they are a symbol of equality, they show that everyone is different, they mean happiness and they represent childhood and nature.
- We shaped our rainbow like an open book.
 This again represents learning but also, it represents the idea that two working together can create something beautiful.
- The Children The child with the magnifying glass is representing investigation, the child



with the ball is representing sport, the child with the globe is representing Geography and the child with the page is representing the Arts.

 The Colour Blue represents a number of things. First, it is the colour of Dublin. We are a proud Dublin school! Secondly, it represents autism and being inclusive of everybody. Finally, it is a calming, welcoming colour.

I'm really proud of all the children in Citywest and will treasure this crest for years to come.



Back to Basics: Learn Together Belief Systems Strand

At this time of year there will be a lot of new teachers coming to grips for the first time with the Learn Together curriculum and maybe even some existing one's looking for a refresher. With this in mind, I've answered some of the questions I get in relation to the Belief Systems strand of the Learn Together curriculum.

What world religions should I teach about?

The Learn Together involves the six main world religions; Buddhism; Sikhism; Islam; Christianity; Hinduism and Judaism

Does the Learn Together include world views other than formal religions?

Yes! Every teacher should also teach about Atheism: Agnosticism and Humanism. We're currently working on updating the Learn Together curriculum, these worldviews will be more obviously included in the update.

That's an awful lot of information to cover in the time allowed for the Learn Together programme, any suggestions?

Each teacher should be allowing 30 minutes per day for teaching all elements of all four strands of the Learn Together Ethical Education Curriculum. It seems like a lot, but to cover it adequately you

should only cover the six main world religions (as above), but keep it light. There is no need to go into details regarding sub-divisions of these religions, such as Catholicism / Protestantism under Christianity; Shia / Sunni under Islam or the many denominations of Hinduism, etc.

Ok, so I'm thinking of a child in my class from another belief background, should I teach about this belief background?

The short answer is no. Of course in order to ensure that child's belief identity is affirmed you should recognise this perspective and give the child the opportunity regularly to speak of significant events and festivals, etc. However, this belief system does not need to be explicitly

Now I have the basics where can I find resources on this strand?

Educate Together has developed resources with the Humanist Association of Ireland for use with 1st / 2nd and 3rd / 4th classes. You'll find these and a number of other resources to support you in teaching the Belief Strand of the Learn Together on the Educate Together Resource Bank (www. learning.educatetogether.ie)


New Resources in the Ethical Education Resource Bank



What is the Ethical Education Resource Bank?


The Ethical Education Resource Bank is developed and maintained by Educate Together to support teachers of Ethical Education in Educate Together schools. The Moodle site contains lesson plans, ideas and resources suitable for Ethical Education. There is one resource bank for primary teachers and one for second-level teachers. Ethical Education Curriculum Developed for 5th and 6th Year Students

Educate Together's first three second-level schools opened in 2014 which means that this year will see students in Hansfield Educate Together Secondary School, Kishoge Community College and Ballymakenny College continue their Senior Cycle journey into 5th Year and for a small number of students in Hansfield ETSS, 6th Year. Along with core subjects such as English, Irish and Maths, students will continue to study Ethical Education in 5th and 6th Year.

Senior Cycle Ethical Education Development Process

The Board of Directors sub-committee on Education and its subsidiary working group (which includes experienced curriculum developers) have been guiding the development process of the senior cycle Ethical Education curriculum. This involved commissioning Ethical Education teacher, Ciara McMackin, who works in Kishoge Community College to work on developing the curriculum over the past number of months.

Input from students and teachers on the curriculum content

Getting input from students and teachers formed an important part of the process and influenced the content and approach taken.

The curriculum will be piloted this year and revised accordingly. It contains six strands which are

designed to be taught consecutively over the two vears. The curriculum follows the approach taken in Junior Cycle and Transition Year with a focus on the development of students' knowledge, skills, attitudes and values. In support of this approach, specific Ethical Theory and Ethical Skills are identified in each strand.

The curriculum emphasises innovative, inquirybased, practical learning – so that students build the habit of ethical behaviour.

'Senior Cycle Ethical Education prepares our young adults to enter the world not only academically capable, but with the knowledge. skills and considered attitudes and values to use that capability for good.' Ciara McMackin, Ethical Education teacher and Senior Cycle Ethical Education Curriculum Developer.

Teacher Guide

To assist teachers with leading and facilitating learning in Senior Cycle Ethical Education, the curriculum is accompanied by a Senior Cycle Ethical Education Teacher Guide. This Teacher Guide breaks down the curriculum into lessons with associated resources and guidelines for assessment. 



The Teaching Council have written to all Principals with important information regarding the employment of Newly Qualified Teachers. From September 2018 Droichead will be the only route of induction for NQTs in:

- Special Education Needs settings in all schools
- Primary schools where there are 16 or more mainstream teachers and
- Post-primary schools of 400 or more students

All public bodies, including schools, have a statutory obligation to monitor and report energy use. From January 2019, schools can login to SEAI's online system to report annual energy consumption and related data for 2018. The deadline for submitting energy usage and related data is 5 April 2019.

SEAI will offer free monitoring and reporting workshops for schools.

Energy Awareness posters for schools

Schools can order free bi-lingual posters (English/Irish) from SEAI. The suite of 5 posters communicate energy saving messages submitted by students to SEAI's annual school's competition.



Top Energy Saving Tips

Did you know between 50-70% of energy use in schools is for space heating? With the weather getting colder here are some tips for reducing heating energy use and maintaining comfort levels:

- Do Keep track of your fuel deliveries in order to track fuel savings or fuel wastage
- Do Read the manual on how to operate your storage heaters correctly (if your school uses these).
- Do Set your room thermostats to 18 degrees
- Don't Cover radiators or allow new furniture to cover radiators.
- Don't Ignore stuck radiator valves. Get them fixed.
- Don't Open windows to control temperatures when heating is on.
