Stronger Together





Leading change

In 2022 Educate Together is a diverse network of 117 schools across 21 counties in Ireland, ranging from small rural primary schools to large urban secondary schools with a shared vision and mission.

Our network has grown out of a movement for change which began in the 1970s, led by parents seeking schools where children of all social, cultural and religious backgrounds learn together and are equally respected.

For more than 40 years Educate Together has pioneered equality-based education in Ireland; challenging inequalities and striving to ensure that every child reaches their full potential. We have developed a unique Ethical Education curriculum that focuses on questions of equality, justice, sustainability and active democratic citizenship, and supports students to meaningfully and critically reflect upon the world around them.

Demand for equality-based education has grown rapidly in recent decades and Educate Together has led the way in meeting that demand. As a school patron, we have opened more than 50 schools across Ireland in the past 10 years, growing the number of students in the network to more than 35,000.



Innovation and opportunity

Creativity and innovation have always been central to Educate Together's development; our primary Ethical Education curriculum, Learn Together, is acclaimed in Ireland and abroad. Our groundbreaking second-level model has proved both popular and successful since the first schools opened in 2014. Research has shown that our schools are leading the way in promoting inclusion, collaborative and student-centred approaches, and the development of global competencies.*

A key challenge for Educate Together now is to meet growing demand. The current pace of change is too slow and a new approach is needed to re-balance our education system, especially in areas of stable population. Educate Together is pioneering new ways of expanding access, for example through innovative school partnerships. Reforms are also required to ensure that new and developing schools have the resources they need to support every child in reaching their full potential; from physical infrastructure to staffing, leadership and other supports.

This plan sets out Educate Together's goals for the next five years; to support quality and build capacity across our organisation and school network, to lead on important system reforms, and to increase access to equality-based education so that this model is available to more children and young people, whatever their background and wherever they live. To achieve these goals, we look forward to working with supporters and partner organisations who share our vision.

Our schools are state-funded, child-centred and democratically run. As a school patron and membership organisation, Educate Together has responsibilities in relation to the governance and management of schools, which include school ethos.



Through a unique Ethical Education curriculum, our schools develop students' knowledge, skills and attitudes in equality, human rights and sustainability. This supports children and young people to develop as critical thinkers and nurtures creativity and respect for others.

Educate Together strives to continuously improve the quality of the delivery of our equality-based ethos. This means ensuring our schools are evolving to meet the changing needs of every student and actively supporting all to develop as competent, emotionally literate global citizens.

Educate Together's impact

A network of nurture schools

Educate Together launched the Nurture Schools project in 2020 and now has 35 schools (27 primary and 8 post-primary schools) participating. The project aims to support students with social, emotional and behavioural difficulties in primary and second-level schools to get them back on track and engaged with their education. The concept of Nurture in education recognises that students' wellbeing is critically linked to their engagement with school and resulting academic outcomes. This innovative project brings together Educate Together's most disadvantaged schools and is the first of its kind in Ireland to adopt the nurture approach across a network of primary and second-level schools. Evidence gathered through schools' engagement with Nurture will also illustrate and support the link between the approach and improved social and academic outcomes for students experiencing educational disadvantage.

An ethos quality framework

Educate Together's impact

Student voice

Educate Together schools are democratic environments where all community members - students, parents and teachers - have a voice in how the school is run. This objective has been at the heart of the Educate Together ethos since the 1970s.

Educate Together schools are actively committed to listening to and raising student voices. Debate, deliberative dialogue and discussion are nurtured. Schools have student councils or assemblies which contribute to school life and the wider community. At second-level, Educate Together students are welcomed on boards of management and invited to participate in shaping school policy. Students from Educate Together schools have led initiatives on climate action advocacy, demonstrations and rallies in recent years.



Advocacy

Educate Together actively seeks changes that will improve school experiences and outcomes for generations of young people in Ireland. Our objectives are aligned with forward-looking strategies and reforms at national and international levels:

- Our Charter is closely aligned with Human Rights objectives and UN Sustainable Development Goals, especially Goal 4 ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education.
- Our work to establish a national network of equality-based schools supports the target of 400 multi-denominational primary schools by 2030 in the Programme for Government.
- Our focus on equity and supporting every child to reach their full potential is in line with Goal 2 of the 'Department of Education Statement of Strategy 2021-2023'.
- Our Nurture Schools project supports student well-being, develops social and emotional skills and contributes to a range of the outcomes set out in 'Better Outcomes, Brighter Futures'.
- Our commitment to raising students' voices is aligned with the 'National Framework for Children and Young People's Participation in Decision-Making.'
- Our new second-level schools are pioneering student-centred and inclusive approaches to curriculum development that can inform and support vital reforms at Senior Cycle.
- Our Ethical Education curriculum is aligned with national and European strategies for Education for Sustainable Development and Global Citizenship Education.



Developing and implementing our strategy

This plan has been developed collaboratively over three years. The process included:

- Engagement with our network of member schools
- Consultation with external stakeholders and partners
- Review of the demographic, educational and policy context
- Reflection on our Values, Constitution and Charter

We are very grateful to all the boards of management, school staff, volunteers and partners who assisted with and contributed to the development of this plan.



In order to achieve our goals, we will:

- Partner with organisations and funders who share our values and goals
- Set clear targets and monitor progress towards our objectives
- Connect our school communities with each other and our national office so we can work together to effect change
- Develop structures to meaningfully engage volunteers, supporters and alumni in our national-level objectives
- Reflect on and evaluate our actions regularly, taking care to listen to all perspectives
- Review our strategy annually to take account of our changing context and resources

2022 - 2026: resilience & renewal

In recent years, schools have been deeply affected by Covid-19, which has impacted the wellbeing of students, school staff and communities, and increased educational inequalities. Progress towards vital system reforms has stagnated and Educate Together's equality-based ethos is needed more than ever.

There is growing awareness of the need for change, and greater recognition than ever of the importance of children's rights, inclusive practices and sustainability. Leaving Certificate reform is finally on the agenda.

Educate Together has led on Junior Cycle reform, pushing boundaries on student-centred learning and integrating critical thinking skills across the curriculum. Our second-level schools are perfectly placed to extend this reform to senior cycle and build momentum for meaningful system change.

Recent decades have seen significant social reforms in Ireland against a backdrop of changing attitudes and beliefs. This shift is reflected in huge and growing demand for equality-based education at primary and second-level, but the system has been slow to respond.

Educate Together has led the way in equality-based education for 40 years, supporting communities to establish schools and pioneering student-centred and democratic approaches to curriculum, teaching and learning and school management.

Parents now have a say in the patronage of new schools, with the result that most schools that open in urban areas are now equality-based. However, these schools quickly become oversubscribed. Successive governments have set targets for 400 'multi-denominational' schools by 2030, but there is no coherent plan to reconfigure provision and no transparent mechanism for change in areas of stable population, so parents continue to have no choice in many areas.

The time is right for a new approach to achieve change on a wider scale and Educate Together is well-placed to lead that change. By supporting parents and communities seeking this option, sharing our experience and working constructively with all stakeholders, together we can shift the log-jam and develop a clear roadmap to a future where all families can access equality-based education, wherever they live.



Our vision for 2026



Through increasing the number of students we reach, improving supports for our schools to thrive and innovate, and targeting our advocacy to enable equality-based, student-centred and democratic education across all levels, we will maximise our impact in education and society.

In five years:

- Educate Together will be a stronger, sustainable network of equality-based schools in which more than 45,000 students are directly engaged and supported.
- School communities will be accessing high-quality ethos guidance, resources, training and supports through a dedicated online Hub.
- Key school staff and volunteers will be engaged in relevant communities of practice that nurture creativity and innovation.
- Students will increase their involvement in decision-making which will be evident across the network.
- Communities seeking equality-based schools will be supported with an agreed national roadmap for school transfers.
- New and developing schools will benefit from targeted advocacy which will result in improvements in conditions.

Goal 1

Quality & capacity



Strengthen the network and shared values across Educate Together schools.

In the past ten years the Educate Together network has grown and diversified rapidly. Our primary school enrolments have more than doubled and second-level schools now make up nearly 20% of our network. This growth is vital to meet the demand for equality-based education.

As we grow we need to ensure that every student in our network is fully included and supported, and that every school has a shared understanding of what it means to be an Educate Together school. To implement and embed a school ethos that is equality-based, child-centred and democratic requires strong school leadership and outstanding teachers, as well as support and guidance.

Goal 2 **Leadership**



Be a leading voice for innovation and reform in education, continually striving for wider system change.

The Educate Together movement has been a driving force for change in Irish education since the 1970s. Yet today, families and teachers still face many barriers as they strive to access or provide equality-based education.

As well as supporting creativity and innovation in our schools, we need to seek systemic reforms that will reduce inequalities and promote inclusion. Addressing the imbalance of school types is central, but there are many other issues to be tackled; resourcing new and developing schools, reforming curriculum and teacher education and including children with additional needs - the list can seem endless and our resources are limited. A systematic approach is required so that campaigns are efficient and effective.

Increase the number of Educate Together school places

Recent growth of the equality-based school network has been steady, with the addition of 28 primary schools and 21 second-level schools since 2014. The total number of students in Educate Together schools has doubled in seven years, reaching 35,400 in 2021.

However, this constitutes just 5% of students at primary and 2% of students at second-level. In 2022 there are still six counties without an Educate Together primary school, four with only denominational primary schools, and our second-level schools are located in just eight counties. Furthermore, most of our schools are heavily oversubscribed, meaning that even where schools exist, growing demand for equality-based education is not met.

Key terms

School patron

In the Irish education system, each school has a patron or joint patrons. The patron typically sets up the school and defines its characteristic spirit, or 'ethos'. Individual schools are managed by boards of management on behalf of the patron(s). Sometimes the patron also has a role in school buildings.

Equality-based ethos

School ethos generally refers to the core values, beliefs, attitudes and practices of an educational community. In Educate Together schools, the ethos of the school is 'equality-based'. This reflects a commitment to equity and children's rights, whereby children of all social, cultural and religious backgrounds have equal rights of access to the school and are equally respected, and every child is supported to reach their full potential.

School management body

As a recognised school management body at primary level, Educate Together represents school boards of management in national negotiations and stakeholder forums, and supports boards to carry out their management functions.

Board of management

The board of management is the body of persons appointed by the patron to manage the school on behalf of the patron. As patron, Educate Together offers training and support to boards of management, helping schools maintain high standards of leadership and governance.

Educate Together national office

Educate Together is a school patron, an educational charity and a company limited by guarantee. The national office is responsible for carrying out Educate Together's role as a patron, a school management body and a membership organisation, with the oversight of the Board of Directors (the charity's trustees). It appoints and supports school boards of management, oversees the appointment of school staff, and supports, articulates and develops Educate Together's equality-based and democratic ethos.

Ethical Education

Ethical Education is a central component of the Educate Together model. As a curriculum that is living in Ireland's equality-based schools, it focuses on questions of equality, justice, sustainability and active citizenship, and seeks to support students to meaningfully and critically reflect upon the world around them.

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
